

I see His Blood upon the Rose
By Joseph Mary Plunkett (1887-1916)
With Thanks from Frances Stone

I see his blood upon the rose And in the stars the glory of his eyes, His body gleams amid eternal snows, His tears fall from the skies.

I see his face in every flower, The thunder and the singing of the birds Are but his voice – and carven by his power Rocks are his written words.

All pathways by his feet are worn, His strong heart stirs the ever-beating sea, His crown of thorns is twined with every thorn, His cross is every tree.



Joseph was married in prison just before his execution at the age of 28, 100 years ago, after the Irish Easter Rising of 1916.

He identifies the suffering of the cross with the suffering and injustice of the World and the political conflict that would cost him his life. There is also the hope of redemption woven through his poem through the resurrection, the last amazing word on the events of Holy week.

MEDITATION THE PARABLE OF THE HIDDEN TREASURE

"The Kingdom of Heaven is like a treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it....in his joy he went and sold all he had and bought that field". (St Matthew Chapter 13, verse 44)

This parable will sound strange to us, but it was a perfectly natural occurrence in Palestine in the time of Jesus. Banks did exist in the ancient world, but ordinary people were not able to use them. As a result, they buried their most precious belongings in the ground. The Rabbis (the teachers in



Israel) had a saying "...there is only one safe place for money – the earth." In finding this treasure, the man had a perfect right to keep it, for Jewish Law stated that this sort of "find" belonged to the finder. He had the right to ensure it was his. The old saying of "finders keepers" applied here.

This however is not the point of the parable. It was the **JOY** of the discovery that made the man willing to give up everything to make the treasure absolutely his own. The lesson of the parable is that the man wasn't deliberately seeking to find the treasure – he found it unexpectedly, in the course of going about his business.

We too can find treasure when we least expect it. Without deliberately seeking him, Our Lord and the Kingdom of Heaven may be found in the course of our daily work or activities, or in the people we meet. If we accept Our Lord's way of life it can become our way of life too. We develop a close personal relationship with him and he becomes the focal point of all we say and do. To make the Kingdom of Heaven our own can involve a complete change of direction in our life. Our ambitions, our values, our interests and associations may need to be abandoned if they are contrary to life in the Kingdom of Heaven.

Jesus points out that making such changes is well worth while -in fact, to be desired above all else.

To be a citizen of the Kingdom of Heaven is the most precious thing that a person can possess. This is emphasised in the Parable of the Pearl. (St Matthew chapter 13, verses 4-5)

The attributes of the Kingdom which will show in our lives (even though imperfectly) are qualities such as patience, joy, gentleness, kindness, peace and love. Such qualities marked the life of Our Lord. Compare these with the sorts of characteristics which are often seen in our present society – jealousy, hatred, envy, anger, arrogance, selfishness.

When we belong to Our Heavenly Father we become "a member of Christ, the child of God and an inheritor of the Kingdom of Heaven". (The Catechism)




