

Justice has become like an oil painting recognized from a distance, Churches cry for transparency and action from foreign governments, demanding political change for refugee and environmental issues but perhaps we can't see the wood for the trees.

Justice for Farmers is an international issue, Governments weigh in on so many parts of community life, regulate so much but they have allowed farmers to wear the cost of mismanagement and bad corporate decisions and our own communities are suffering. Dairy Farmers are compromised by government inaction and corporate greed and the proposed package of loans and counselling is like being hugged by the perpetrator after being hit in the face. Home gown justice is a great theme for every community. We cannot with any integrity ask governments to act when we are silent in areas over which the church as direct control such as discrimination and inclusion.

During the recent Synod we were represented by Angela Braybrooks, Kaye Kennedy and Robyn Slade. The Strategic Plan was presented, real questions of viability raised and Vicki Chick elected to Bishop in Council, congratulations and thanks to all.

Trinity Anglican College gave us a great gift in their company and representatives of staff, council, students, families and chaplain. Reverend Bryn gave a very engaging sermon on the inclusiveness of the Trinity, not either/or but this/that and His thoughts knocked out a few walls in our thinking about choices and faith, gave us all more room to grow. Reverend Christine Moimoi from St David's and Reverend Maureen Beattie also created Albury church history when they swapped churches on a Sunday morning for Pentecost and again helped us understand more about the movement of the Spirit. Reverend

Christine's hair colour moved to bright red on the day but local word is that the colour may have moved back by now.

The Celtic model of spirituality is an antidote to the remoteness of church government, it gives responsibility and decision making back to local communities and asks how our faith can be locally expressed.

We look forward to the Celtic service, the music and prayers but also to the local action and vitality that it releases.

Tax time is also an opportunity and the st Matthews Music foundation for country kids and National Trust (St Matthews) are opportunities to make a local difference. The recent masterclass and concert by Dr Donna Coleman was an outstanding success and we look forward to her return.

The Music Foundation is making possible the benefit concert for Shanul Sharma 18th June at 3pm, Martin Setchell, Celebrity Organist 26th June at 2.30pm and Wednesday 13th July we welcome the famous Choir of Christ College Cambridge.

Exciting news - The Bhutanese Garden continues to flourish in the church grounds as does our relationship with the Bhutanese community.

Friends of Nolan House are making great strides in the area of mental health.

St Matthews crisis care and our Pop up op shop has found a home for the winter in the Globe Arcade opposite the church in Kiewa Street, donations of winter clothing, jumpers and coats are urgently needed at the office and volunteers are needed!!!

MEDITATION

THE PARABLE OF THE SHREWD MANAGER (St Luke Ch:16 verse 1)

Jesus told his disciples **-There was a rich man whose Manager was accused of fraud**..... "give an account of your management because you cannot be manager any longer." (verses 1 & 2)

There is no doubt that this Manager was dishonest. He was an intelligent scoundrel who, when he realised he was about to be audited, made provision for life after he was sacked. A smart "cookie".

In Palestine in the time of Our Lord there were many absentee Landlords. In this Parable it is most likely that the Manager in question had an absentee Landlord as his employer – and now the Manager was being accused of embezzlement.

But he wasn't the only dishonest one. The sharefarmers who owed the owner rent were also involved in this fraud. The Manager knew he would be sacked, so he hatched up a brilliant idea. He falsified the entries in the books of account so that the share farmers were charged less than they actually owed. This was done for 2 reasons:-

1. The debtors would be grateful to the Manager for owing a smaller debt and may reward him in some way.

2. If the Manager ended up in trouble in the future, he could maybe blackmail the share farmers and earn some money for himself in that way.

Instead of being shocked, the Landlord (owner of the vineyard) actually praised the Manager for his astute response. He seems to be a bit of a scoundrel himself.

The main point of this parable is that material possessions (wealth) can be used for good purposes.

The Jewish Rabbis had a saying – "the rich help the poor in this world, but the poor help the rich in the world to come." In other words, assistance given to others in the spirit of self-sacrifice, and love, following the example of Our Lord, would stand a person in good stead in the world to come.

The use or abuse of wealth can affect our world too. People who use their wealth unselfishly can really make a difference to the well being of those who are struggling.

We need to be reminded that wealth in itself is not to be condemned, but those who are wealthy have a responsibility to use it wisely for the good of others and not just on themselves. St Ambrose wrote, "the bosoms of the poor, the houses of widows, the mouths of children are the wealth which lasts forever."

A person's true wealth consists not in the possessions they have, but in what they give away. Jesus says, "do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth where thieves break in and steal... but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven" (St Matthew ch:6 verse 19-20)






