




#### Fr Peter writes—Dear People of St Matthew's

Holy, holy, holy! Lord God Almighty! Early in the morning our song shall rise to thee. Holy, holy, holy! Merciful and mighty, God in three Persons, blessèd Trinity.



The most famous hymn on the **Most Holy Trinity** was written by Reginald Heber when he was Bishop of Calcutta and Australia formed part of his diocese. It marks a time when the liturgical colour turns to **Green** thinking of growing through the year toward Advent in what some prayer books term "*Ordinary* Sundays. My prayer is that each Sunday might be **extraordinary** continuing to build on the foundations laid. Of particular note is the **impressive St Matthews Memorial Forecourt**. Made possible through the generosity of individuals and families through bequests and individual donations. The garden is a place of beauty and tranquillity in the heart of Albury and has already become a haven for birdlife and visitors who walk down the processional walkway to look at the fountain adding the wonderful musical sound of its cascade to the song of the magpies and their babies. Please take this opportunity to give a denotation so that it can be completed otherwise the garden may go to sleep in winter and not awaken in the spring or just stall because the money has run out although the goodwill and good intentions are still very much alive.

Often people say "I really had no idea that help was needed or I would have done something" I can report to you that if everyone gave even a small donation it will have a lasting and immediate effect and we look forward to opening it officially in the spring possibly on the 18<sup>th</sup> of September, the Sunday closest to St Matthews Day.

With the end of the financial year being the 30<sup>th</sup> of June I am also happy to remind you that a donation toward our *church cooling* can be made as indicated at the top of the opposite page. For \$60,000 we could be as cool in the blazing heat as anywhere in the diocese making worship, wedding concerts and other events much more comfortable and imagine Christmas without "Melting at St Matthews" so if 120 people gave \$500 dollars it would be accomplished.

None of this would make any sense without the reality of the wonderful support that we have week by week in the services, concerts and events at St Matthews. Of particular note the historic service of Choral Mattins drew 180 people who expressed nothing short of joy at the wonderful music, liturgy and ceremonial of the day and is sure to be repeated. Someone said it made me think of "the penny in my glove that my mother used to give for the collection" and many thanks to our musicians and parishioners for the outstanding effort.

Sister Grace is continuing to inspire with her preaching and assistance at Trinity Anglican College, Baptisms and some of our outreach programs in addition to implementing our strategic plan.



At evensong at St. Matthew's Albury, on 1st May, Archdeacon Peter MacLeod-Miller presented chorister Jill Moodie with her Silver Medal Award from the Royal School of Church Music.

Because this is an international award, there were no accredited examiners in Australia, Jill travelled to New Zealand in January, where she attended the RSCM Summer School in Hamilton. Whilst there she was examined and assessed for her Silver Award which she attained with Merit.

The Award comprises five sections (1) singing (psalms, hymns, anthems, solos); (2) Musical Skills (sight reading, aural tests, (3) Repetoire (understanding the text and musical styles, historical and liturgical contexts); (4) Belonging to the choir-(commitment) and (5) Choir in context (biblical knowledge of liturgical texts, knowledge of the structure and form of services such as the Eucharist, Evensong etc.)

The delay in presentation was due to the medal being sent from RSCM Headquarters in the UK to the President of the RSCM in N.Z. who lives in Christchurch. The earthquake devastated Christchurch, understandably meaning that forwarding of the medal to Jill was put on hold due to other priorities.

Jill had previously held the RSCM Red Ribbon for choristers, and becomes the first St. Matthew's Chorister to achieve the Silver Award.

### What is a ministry Field Committee?

A field committee consists of a diverse group of people who are active members of the parish who are selected because they represent different facets of parish life. They meet monthly with the Deacon/Curate to provide support, encouragement and feedback to assist in his/her first year of ordained ministry. The members are to provide caring and honest feedback about the ministry and the way it is perceived – in other words how you see and respond to the ministry. Members of the congregation may seek out members of the committee and give them feedback to take to committee meetings. The Feedback is to be descriptive and non judgemental, specific and not general, appropriate and usable. For instance rather than say you conducted that meeting badly it would be helpful to say something like, "I noticed that Paul Jones changed the subject". It is better to talk about a particular sermon rather than preaching in general. It would not be helpful to say your sermon was incomprehensible (a judgement statement) rather you might say "I was not clear about what you meant when you spoke about...."

Sr Grace now has a Field Committee in this Parish to help her in her formation for ministry and the members are: Mark & Cathy Carden; Sandra Halford; Carol Read; Ray Fietz; Neal Gunn; Angela Braybrooks; Maureen Beattie (Chair person).

Please feel free to speak to any of these members should you wish to offer her feedback for her ministry training. The field committee will meet the third Wednesday of each month at 5.30pm.
