Thank you—Thanks to an anonymous donor who has given a substantial amount for Pastoral Care and Outreach work within the church. Parish Council and the Rector will decide where this money will be spent. It can be used for leaflets, cards and the setting up for programmes.

Garden—he garden is looking fabulous. Coralie & Annie are very busy working in the garden.

Safety Issues—Handrails are to be put on the lectern & pulpit.

Parking—If you are unable to get a park in Kiewa St, you are invited to park behind the church when services are on.

Font to Lady Chapel—Looking at get a font that can be moved around.

Altar Frontal—s a work in progress.

Media—The Christmas broadcast for iprime will come from St Matthew's. Prime will also come & do a news story on the packing of the Christmas hampers.

Outreach/Pastoral Care—There will be a service in the Church for residents from Nursing Homes/ hostels & those who are housebound. Finances—At the 31st October the closing balance in the No 1 a/c was 35,922.66 Less cheques to be paid \$18,204.45. Closing balance in the No 2 a/c was \$30,321.84 less cheques to be paid \$749.07.

Relay for Life—Thank you to everyone who donated to this worthy cause. Thank you to those who participated. This year's relay raised \$370,000.00 with the St Matthew's teams contributed \$1095 towards this amount. I hope next year more will join the team & we raise more money. So keep the weekend of the 26th 27th October 2013 free. The venue is yet to be decided.

Confirmation—to be held on the 9th December. There are about a dozen candidates, some children, some adults which is very encouraging.

Bar-b-cue—A barbecue has been donated this can be used by all groups for church functions. Thank you to the donors. I am sure it will be well used.

Candles—We now have battery operated candles in the sanctuary. This is making life much easier for our Verger.

The Church, Youth and all things Possible.

Youth values are assets not liabilities. Can we think about Human asset management? It's about strategies, directions and outcomes and positive reinforcement not just judgment and condemnation and revenge. "An eye for an eye would leave the whole world blind" **Gandhi**. Baptism and confirmation is about positive Christian identity and life direction not about 'love with a gun at its head'. The newly appointed Archbishop of Canterbury is heading an upper house inquiry into ethics and banking in the UK. This has allowed the Church to put itself in a position of exploring the ethical and moral behaviour of society around the world. In the Anglican world it is not just to come up with simple answers but utilizing scripture, tradition and reason to ask some tough questions. Developing a Christian Haiku might be one way of moving forward and bringing others along with us.



OUR TIME IS NOW

The challenges of Youth Mental Health have a flow-on ripple effect throughout the community and there needs to be an integrated response from the church that looks at the whole person; body, mind and spirit. It's a matter of taking the problem seriously and demonstrating politically. These issues need to be worked upon either by starting Youth Help programs in churches or by advocating and pursuing the creation of institutionalised Mental Health response services such as Headspace. Immediate action of clergy and the broad community in general should be to resolve these underlying issues and the bottlenecks that are facing the community and its action on Youth Mental Health rather than proposing strategies to deal with these issues in the distant future. Response to Natural disasters, institutionalised scandals as well as pay rises for MP's takes on an immediate effect and not put in a holding pattern until economic circumstances make it safe to land. Why is the welfare of Australian youth put on the backburner?

CHANGING THE CULTURE

We as Young Christians have the opportunity to be Market Makers and will be leading the way by sparking and feeding the fire of Social Justice. Leading from these initiatives The Bishop of Wangaratta's Social Justice Competition has received over 50 entries from educational institutions around the Diocese and from as far as Melbourne and Brisbane. This is an excellent result and an extraordinary example of response by Young Australians gearing for the issues that currently face refugees and asylum seekers. These entries are now being marked and the Final Result of the competition will be announced by our Final Judges **Julian Burnside** AO QC, leading human rights advocate and social justice commentator, **Rowan Callick**, South-East Asian correspondent for The Australian and **Bishop John Parkes**. For Allocating their precious time and effort I would also like to thank Cathy Carden, Jane Atkinson and Marion Bennett for being our preliminary judges.

REAL CHRISTMAS REAL HOPE

Prayer and action God being born into our world was not just about a good idea but actually doing it and breaking into our reality. Christmas is about world realities colliding and working together for outcomes that we can be proud of to lay on our table. At this time of the year we need to pray for all Christians abroad and at home, who are persecuted for believing in our faith and for whom Christmas as we know it, is far from the first thing on their minds. The Youth wants to take a positive response in our community and we have decided to take on the preparation of Anglicare Hampers for vulnerable people in our community. These hampers will include Christmas treats for those who will receive them. We will also help decorate St Matthew's for Christmas. This year we will also be present for Carols by Candlelight at Albury helping to bring a real nativity to the local community following the examples of St Francis of Assisi. It's God's real story breaking into our real story, its God's real offer of rescue into our real lives.

New Year and New issues.

Being the good news Local and Global. Even before the dawn of the New Year shines through, AAY will be taking on a subject that is close to most farmers and affecting rural communities, we will be looking at Local Goods and Local Products. This new program will look at helping local farmers compete with the BIG 2 retail companies. It will allow us to promote local producers in an innovative

manner ensuring that these producers do not lose on the opportunity to sell their ucts and overcome the market malfunctions. This program will look at Diary producers in Albury and also other food producers who have been participating in the local farmer's market. A day outing is being organised sometime in early January, All Diocesan Youth are invited to join us and should contact St Matthews office or their local parish and register. This could make a difference and we are looking at the way the idea has been taken up in Australia and other countries and repackage it to give it legs in local paddocks and communities.

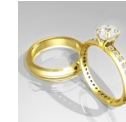

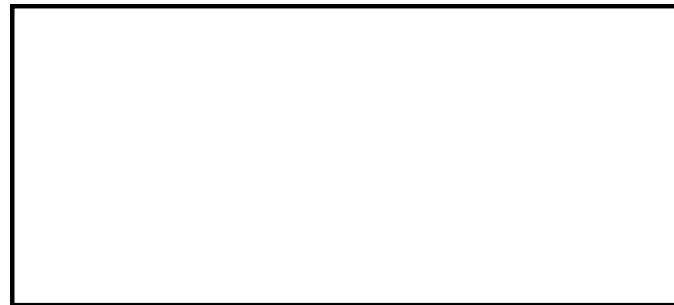
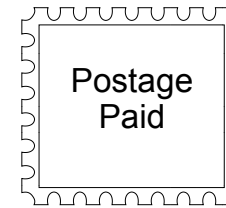
