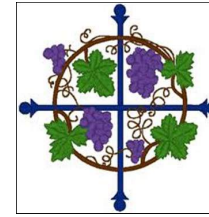

John Newton (1725-1807)'s famous hymn has a message of good news of victory and freedom that is easily understood by the whole community ,perhaps because of those themes lived out in the experience of the hymns author John Newton, a former slave trader who became a slave himself then a leader who fought to liberate slaves and abolish slavery

The Easter story will only mean something by sharing the message with the unsuspecting and giving them a real reason to rejoice .Christ is risen!!means nothing to a homeless person if that news fails to inspire us to help them ,it means nothing if we allow the doors to remain shut against people who are rejected ,if we fail to use our political opportunity to make a difference where we can .It may mean forgiving the unforgivable ,showing a welcome or backtracking and revisiting a situation when all hope has been given up and it looks like a dead end .

To translate the Easter message into language that an unsuspecting outsider can understand rather than blindly reading from the script of previous generations is the task we are approaching with the faith and joy of our whole parish with all the musical ,liturgical ,pastoral and practical caring resources that we hold together

The Easter message of news ALMOST too good to be true will continue to be explored in a thread going through Lent and the rest of the year following the 800th anniversary of Magna Carta with the themes of "Justice ,liberty and community" we have had outstanding Lenten lectures in Beth Wilson former Victorian health commissioner, Bishop John our own bishop who addressed 20 children as well as a full congregation ,professor Geoffrey Blainey Australia's greatest historian giving what many have described as the most inspiring address they have ever heard.2015 Tasmanian of the year human rights and marriage equality activist Rodney Croome, Police Superintendent Beth Stirton in the 100th year of women policing in Australia.

Continuing the theme Eminent human rights advocate Julian Burnside will speak at St Matthews on Magna Carta Sunday June 14 2015 and Australia most famous Judge Michael Kirby will be with us for our Patronal festival .

Being there for others is at the heart of our project to provide a shower for the homeless and our tax deductible music foundation which continues to train young musicians to share the music ministry gift .

Highlights for April will include a special service on Anzac Sunday 26th commemorating the Great War centenary at 9am.

And a special performance by the Australian Air Force wind Quintet as part of our centenary commemorations of the great war will take place at St Matthews at the end of May

Easter Day will be a feast for the senses with trumpets blazes of new candles and sparklers, real chicks, rabbits and holy water reminding us of new life and hope for our whole community, a great day for young and old. And as we always say at St Matthews All are invited, All are welcome

MEDITATION

THE BEATITUDES (1)

“Blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven” (St Matthew Chapter 5 verses 3-12)

Most people have heard of the Sermon on the Mount, given by Jesus to those who gathered to listen to His teaching.

In the first place these “blessed” or “happy sayings” of Our Lord define the spiritual qualities which are to characterise all His followers. Secondly, each commended quality contains a promise. Thus the promise to the “poor in spirit” is a place in the Kingdom of Heaven.

The above Beatitude means to have a humble dependence on Our Heavenly Father. In a nutshell, this Christian quality is essential for us to be aware of the presence of Our Heavenly Father in our life, in spite of the changes and chances which may come our way. It is a quality commended by God and one which will be more fully realised in the life to come.

This attitude is exemplified in the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector (St Luke 18:9-14) Each went to the Temple to pray. The Pharisee paraded his apparent goodness before God. He gave generously to the Temple, he prayed regularly and so on. The Tax Collector prayed “God be merciful to me a sinner.” It was the Tax Collector who was “poor in spirit”, He acknowledged that he was unworthy (poor in spirit) to be associated with God.

He realised it was only by the love and mercy of Our Heavenly Father that he, a Tax Collector, an outcast of Jewish society, could possibly be given a place in the presence of Our Heavenly Father in the Kingdom of Heaven. The Pharisee was quite proud of his achievements, believing he would automatically be guaranteed a tumultuous welcome into God’s presence. Pride is not the first of the Seven Deadly sins for nothing. In fact it is the exact opposite of “poor in spirit.” Jesus declared that it was the Tax Collector rather than the Pharisee who “went home forgiven before God. ..for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled and he who humbles himself will be exalted.”

This Beatitude does not mean material poverty is a good thing. Christian responsibility requires the alleviation of situations where people live in substandard conditions and lack basic necessities. The poverty which is blessed is the poverty of spirit, which finds its help and strength in Our Heavenly Father.

As the well known hymn expresses it

Nothing in my hand I bring; simply to Thy cross I cling.

Naked come to Thee for dress, helpless look to Thee for grace.

Foul, I to the fountain fly, wash me Saviour or I die. (Rock of Ages Cleft For Me)

WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

The poem "For the Fallen", the fifth verse of which is quoted often, was composed by Laurence Binyon while he was sitting on the cliff-top looking out to sea from the dramatic scenery of the north Cornish coastline.

The poem was written in mid September, 1914, a few weeks after the outbreak of the First World War. During these weeks the British Expeditionary Force had suffered casualties following its first encounter with the Imperial German Army at the battle of Mons on 23rd August, its rear-guard action during the retreat from Mons in late August and the Battle of Le Cateau on 26th August, and its participation with the French Army in holding up the advance of the Imperial German Army at the First Battle of the Marne between 5th and 9th September, 1914.

Laurence said in 1939, that the four lines of the fourth verse came to him first. These words have become especially familiar and famous, having been adopted by various Returned Servicemen's organisations to remind everyone of the debt owed to fallen Service men and women at ceremonies of Remembrance.

However, I would draw your attention to the third verse—

**They went with songs to the battle, they were young,
Straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow.
They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted,
They fell with their faces to the foe.**



This gives us a picture of so many of the young men of 1914-1918. The Riverina and Murray regions of Australia were just about denuded of young men, almost all of whom had volunteered.

A former teacher at Hay War Memorial High School, Sam Willis, wrote a School Song in which he drew attention to the attitude of mind of so many to "The Great Adventure". It took several generations for balance to be restored between the sexes, not to forget the rural workforce.

Hundred years later, we give thanks with grateful hearts as we remember them!

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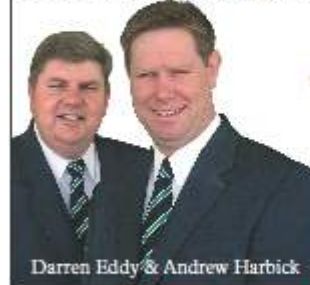

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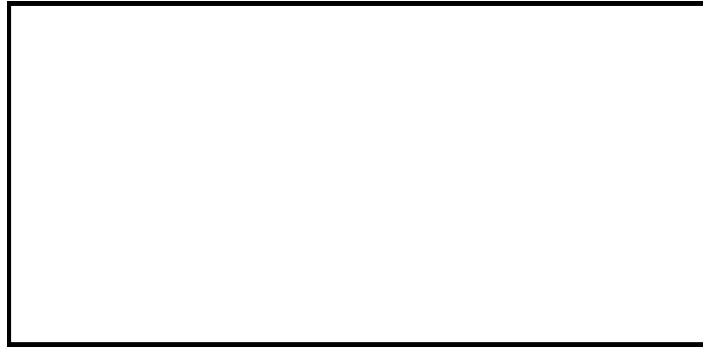
