### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

**Air conditioning**: We have asked for a quote to only have two switches for the air conditioning. It is set at the moment to come on automatically at certain times during the week. If it is needed at other times it can be turned on manually. What is happening at present is it gets turned on to manual but not switched back to automatic. Parish Council would like it set so that if it has been on manual after a certain periods of time it will revert back to automatic.

**Pastoral Care** There will be a service and high tea at Adamshurst on 5<sup>th</sup> August for people who are unable to attend Sunday Church.

Anglican food room 18 food hampers were given out in June and 5 meals.

**Work for the Dole** We are looking into the advantage of having someone that is on work for the dole working at the church. We would be paid \$1000 per placement for 6 months. The only problem with this is they have to be supervised all the time. They will have to work for 25 hours per week.

**Votive candle money box:** Again someone has broken into the cash box and stolen the money. Ray the head verger is looking into ways we can make the cash box more secure. The money collected pays for new candles and other items for the sanctuary.

**Finances** After all the June cheques are cleared there will be a balance of \$4952.30. Plus the deposits for the month of July. We are expecting some very large bills this month, water, gas & electricity, plus the usual accounts we get each month.

### **MEDITATION**

#### THE BEATITUDES (6)



# "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called Matt. 5:9)

Every Christian is meant to be a peacemaker in the home, community and the Church. Although Our Lord said he had 'not come to bring peace but a sword', he meant that conflict would be the inevitable result of his coming into the world. But we should never ourselves seek conflict or be responsible for it. On the contrary, we are called to be peacemakers. We are to actively pursue and strive for peace – and so far as it depends on us, we are to live peaceably with everyone. St Paul writes, "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Do not take revenge my friends.....do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12 verses 17-21)

The meaning of the word "peace" as Jesus uses it, is that the highest task which a person can perform is to establish and keep right relationships between people. But peace-making can be a costly exercise and often involves pain. For example when we are involved in a quarrel, there will be either the pain of apologizing to the person we have injured, or the pain involved in reproving the person who has injured us. Or, we may not be personally involved in a dispute but find ourselves struggling to reconcile two groups or individuals who are at variance with each other. In this case there is the need to listen carefully and sympathetically, rid ourselves of prejudice, and strive to understand the opposing points of view. In spite of this, we risk being misunderstood, or failing in our attempts to bring about reconciliation. But St Paul encourages us..."Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace". The writer of the Psalms says, "Let us seek peace and pursue it". (Psalm 34:14)

In our efforts to reconcile people in the face of conflict, we are performing a god -like work. Just as Our Heavenly Father has reconciled us to himself through the pain Our Lord suffered on our behalf, so we attempt to unite others in the face of bitterness and strife. A good interpretation of this Beatitude could read.. "Blessed are those who help to bring about right relationships between others, for they are doing a god-like work."

O living Christ who still Does all our burdens share Come now and reign within the hearts Of all those everywhere.

At each flash of lightning, the child would stop, look up and smile. More lightning followed quickly, and with each, the girl would look up at the streak of light and smile.


When the mother drew up beside the child, she lowered the window, and called "What are you doing"?


