

John Henry Newman had a faith that looked forward and for his day was amazingly adventurous. It was a faith that broke down barriers and controversially he became a Roman Catholic moving from solid Anglican roots and may have even become something else had he lived long enough. He stands in the same tradition as the much later Sydney Carter who wrote the Lord of the Dance, being a free thinker.

Maundy Thursday washed the feet of groups of people who have been injured by our society and the ignorance of religious traditions including refugees, those of other faiths, women, children, indigenous people, gay and transgender people, the divorced and those who have been abandoned at times of domestic

violence. The walk of witness also featured a good participation from St Matthews with warm wishes for the day shared by friends from the Albury Mosque and bible readings by Kylie from St Matthews congregation.

The Easter services had record numbers and even our newly cleared Lady Chapel being full of seats had every seat taken. The Easter Day was full of life with children running around and the delight of new chicks, including a new member of the Chick family, Isabella being welcomed into the St Matthews family through baptism.

I fully expect that the challenging themes of Lent with a series of speakers on contemporary themes will continue throughout the year. Already on the first Sunday of Easter, St George's Day, we hosted the 1<sup>st</sup> Albury Rovers joining with the Scout movement across the world thinking about doing our best for the community and environment. The Adani Coal mine and its threat to the environment, including the Great Barrier Reef and the threat to society both in

Australia and India were a focus of Lauriston Muirhead's address and an opportunity for action in the spirit of St George through a petition.

Out of evil cometh good. The near miss that almost saw another devastating fire in St Matthews back in January is the reason that scaffolding to clean the damage will be erected this week necessitating some alternatives. Our friends at St David's Uniting Church have kindly offered their hospitality, so we are able to worship with them at 9.30am for the next 2 Sundays (30<sup>th</sup> April and 7<sup>th</sup> May). Later in the year when St David's has their roof done we will glad to return the compliment. We share so much often quietly through material aid and social issues and in previous generations would have been thought too much soon on the wild side but for this fire has opened another opportunity for which we are grateful.

# **CHURCH CLOSED** FOR 2 WEEKS



# MEDITATION THE PARABLE OF THE HOUSEHOLDER & THE HIRED WORKERS

"The situation in the kingdom of heaven is like....a householder who went out first thing in the morning to hire workers for his vineyard". (St Matthew Chapter 20 verses 1-16)

At first sight this parable seems grossly unfair, but that is far from the case. It describes a situation that occurred frequently in Palestine at the time of the grape harvest. The owner of the vineyard would be anxious to harvest his ripe grapes before they could be spoilt by rain, and so he would go to the village market place in search of labourers. He welcomed any who were willing to work, even if they were only able to work for one hour.

The first point the parable makes is that it doesn't matter at what time in a person's life they accept the Christian faith, they are equally precious to Our Heavenly Father. So if someone accepts Our Lord as Saviour late in their life after years of ignoring him, they are just as precious as the person who has served Our Lord all their life.

Jewish teachers had a saying, "Some enter the Kingdom of God in an hour, others hardly enter it in a lifetime." No matter when a person comes to Christ, they are equally dear to him.

There is also an element of tenderness in this parable – the compassion of God. The landowner sought to use the abilities of those in the marketplace who were standing around waiting and hoping to be employed. Naturally those who worked only a few hours would expect to receive less pay than those who worked a full day. But the landowner realised that the men needed to receive a "basic wage" to survive, and if they went home with less, then their families would suffer. Not wanting to cause hardship, he was generous and paid all the workers a full day's wages irrespective of how long they had worked. Our Heavenly Father is like this. He doesn't look upon the amount or length of time we have been loyal to him and his way of life for us – he is overjoyed whatever time in our life we make that commitment. All that we do for God is viewed equally.

Finally, we cannot earn what God has to give us. We may think we can, but everything he gives us is out of his goodness and love for us. Lent and Easter are still fresh in our minds. These seasons of the Church Year

present to us anew the ultimate sacrifice of Our Lord on the cross, the victory over death, and the joy and new life offered by the resurrection. Jesus' promise has been fulfilled. "Because I live, you also will live". (John 14:19)

He is alive and wants to walk with you every day.

Life is God's gift to you.




