Fr Peter writes: Dear People of St Matthew's

Awake, my soul, and with the sun Thy daily stage of duty run; Shake off dull sloth, and joyful rise, To pay thy morning sacrifice.

Praise God, from whom all blessings flow; Praise Him, all creatures here below; Praise Him above, ye heavenly host; Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.



This famous hymn by Thomas Ken the father of modern hymn written is clear evidence of spiritual climate change. He wrote at a time of fear and intolerance and hard to imagine that his hymns were directed to be sung in private and this particular hymn for the students at Winchester. Despite the warning being on the packet and its performance to be suppressed or 'on the quiet' the last verse now known as the doxology is one of the best known of all hymns. very fittingly he directed this hymn to be sung at his funeral at sunrise.

Rising with the new year we have a Parish planning day as we look to the future with Lent almost upon us and the 25th Anniversary of the reopening of the church toward the end of the year. In the meantime we have the daily challenges of a mission practical, compassion and kindness and a place of excellence, safety and sanctuary in the heart of the city.

The first Evensong of the year on 3 February at 5pm, coincides with the first service in Sydney Cove in 1788 and we use the same liturgy from that period, though with the luxury of air conditioning.

Tunes on Tuesday at 1.10pm12 February with Allan Beavis OAM and 26 March with James Strachan. highlights the fabulous St Matthews pipe organ and again with the benefit of world class air-conditioning.

Sharing the love on Valentines Day Human Rights are front and centre and first contribution to community conversation is on 14th February – Rural Australia for Refugees is hosting an evening at Wangaratta – How best to protect our human rights? Panel discussion and Q&A session with Fr Peter MacLeod-Miller, Gillian Triggs, Lee Carnie and Teela Reid

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Lay Invigoration Day – at Purbrick Hall, Wangaratta on 23 February continues an education program on Safe Ministry within the Diocese.



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MEDITATION

ST STEPHEN-THE FIRST CHRISTIAN MARTYR

"While they were stoning him Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my Spirit" (Acts 7:59)

Saint Stephen is celebrated immediately after Christmas (December 26^{th}) and is probably best known from the opening verse of the Carol Good King Wenceslas who looked out "on the Feast of Stephen."

All that we know of Saint Stephen is contained in the book of the Acts of the Apostles, chapters 6 and 7.

Stephen was one of seven young deacons chosen by the

Apostles to help them carry out their work of preaching the Gospel and helping the poor. He is described as being full of faith and the power of the Holy Spirit, and one who did great miracles. (Acts 6:5-8)

Stephen was also a talented preacher, and what he said often upset the Jewish leaders. Such was the opposition against him that some people were prepared to lie about what he had been saying and testify against him. He was brought before the Sanhedrin or ruling Council of the Jews where the leaders were "stung to fury" at what he was saying. He was dragged outside the gates of Jerusalem and stoned to death. As he was dying, he asked Jesus to receive his spirit and not to charge his enemies with their sin. (Acts 7: 54-60)

Saul (later called Paul) witnessed and approved of Stephen's stoning.

Following Stephen's death, Saul went around making murderous threats against the disciples, frightening the believers, and dragging people from their homes and having them put in prison for their faith.

He then gained permission to widen his persecution, so he set out to seek and destroy as many Christians as possible in the Synagogue at Damascus. As he left on his journey, Paul passed through the same Gate where he stood when Stephen was stoned to death. Along the way he was confronted by a bright light and the presence of Jesus. Following this encounter, he became a chosen instrument of the Lord and embraced the Christian faith.

It is not part of the Christian hope to look for a life free from trouble and distress. The Christian hope is that in Christ we can endure the trials that come our way, yet remain strong and finally experience the salvation of God.

Whatever awaits you around the corner, God is already there.

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Royal School of Church Music Gold Award

Four choir members Lyn Winnel, Sarah Winnel, Dianne Prince and Jenny Prince have been presented with the RSCM Gold Award. This is extremely tremendous as they are all from the same family and there are only nine recipients in Australia. They are from St. Matthew's Anglican Church, Albury with the Rector Venerable Peter MacLeod-Miller, Archdeacon of The Hume. This is a very prestigious award to receive due to lots of preparation and hard work as it includes a highly demanding exam that they completed by travelling to England. The structure of the syllabus for the RSCM reflects that of the *Voice for Life* scheme, designed to develop your vocal skills, music understanding and knowledge of repertoire. The award is based on five different sections and requires candidates to prepare ten pieces for examination. They had to demonstrate consistency throughout the examination in each section:

Using the voice well: They chose to sing a hymn, psalm, song, anthem, and liturgical setting. In this section, the examiner was looking for precise intonation; rhythmic accuracy and style; comprehension of the text and communication of the mood of the piece amongst other aspects. Not an easy task for anybody - singing is a physical activity which requires stamina, concentration and dedication.

Musical skills and understanding: Another five pieces were selected for rehearsal and interpretation with questions focusing on technical, interpretative and stylistic aspects. They were also required to demonstrate stylistic awareness upon sight-reading. This is considered essential as choir members need to learn new repertoire as quickly as possible.

Repertoire knowledge: This section involved writing program notes on their chosen hymn, song, anthem and liturgical setting. They were asked questions on matters arising from their program notes, and further understanding of any of their prepared pieces. This made them aware of why they were singing and what they were singing about, personalising the examination with their experience. Belonging to the choir: Two written testimonials were required and participation in the RSCM residential courses which provides valuable experience in church music. They find that it is spiritually uplifting to be a member of their church choir, singing God's messages and helping to lead the congregation in worship.

Choir in context. This section is designed to allow them to show their developing depth of liturgical understanding. They wrote their own Evening Service with a Scripture Reading and Prayer. This focuses on candidates demonstrating an awareness of the significance of musical ministry and an understanding of the pattern and format of services within their church community. The Gold Award was a special project that they focused on and found it uplifting and fulfilling. They enjoyed researching significant events on the religious calendar, exploring different pieces and composers as well as analysing choral music to formulate their ideas and opinions for their portfolio. Their

commitment to the choir and general musical competence and experience brings great rewards. This preparation has strengthened their faith, it has served to assist them in the musical ministry within the choir of St. Matthew's Anglican Church, Albury. Lyn Winnel




After a few minutes of thinking, she nods and says, 'I want you to send her the word 'comfortable.'

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
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
