Dear friends of St Matthew's this is a time of great activity and we are transferring our efforts from the church building that is closed, locked (and loved) to the care of each other and our community. The Easter themes have never been more important. Good Friday is our home page with its themes of isolation, and fear, the dangers of being "out of touch" but the pain and darkness will not have the last word. Our gift to the community (St Matthew's Albury having been burnt out not just locked out) is to support the hope that gives our region and its people of every age, a positive future.

All around the World and in our own community, other pieces of the Holy week jigsaw are being put in place, the humility of God's love among us and the joy of hope and community found in Palm Sunday, the example of service and love in action seen in Maundy Thursday alongside the shared anxieties and temptation to self-interest as seen in the run on supermarket shelves, and the Easter theme of deliverance and the joy that unites us in answer to life greatest challenges and bring us to the themes of belonging security and peace.

I wonder where you can see these themes "up close" this year? The shared joy of hearing good news for one of our loved ones, the loving old fashioned care and concern that breaks out from the busy locked tomb of modern life, the sacrifice of nurses, doctors, cleaners and carers and the way that power can be used to help and to heal rather than to subjugate and hurt -to raise up rather than subdue.

Our palm crosses are folded but this year but, in the freezer, we will hold them in our hearts rather than with our hands because community safety is our most important spiritual tradition.

On Sunday St Matthew's will be dressed in red for action, with palm branches signaling a community joined in, faith hope and love.

You might like to dress in a splash of red as we have a St Matthew's moment having a cuppa and thinking of our world and loved ones.

Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, , near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!"

A decade after the Spanish epidemic Walter de la Mere wrote a famous poem about loneliness, isolation and empathy using the theme of "The Donkey"

Nicholas Nye "The Donkey"

Thistle and darnell and dock grew there, And a bush, in the corner, of may, On the orchard wall I used to sprawl In the blazing heat of the day;

Half asleep and half awake, While the birds went twittering by, And nobody there my lone to share But Nicholas Nye.

Nicholas Nye was lean and gray, Lame of leg and old, More than a score of donkey's years He had been since he was foaled; He munched the thistles, purple and spiked, Would sometimes stoop and sigh, And turn his head, as if he'd said, 'Poor Nicholas Nye!'

Seem to be smiling at me, he would,
From his bush in the corner, of may,Bony and ownerless, widowed and worn,
Knobble-kneed, lonely and gray;
And over the grass would seem to pass
'Neath the deep dark blue of the sky,
Something much better than words between me
And Nicholas Nye.

We are all shocked at the sudden passing of Brian Unthank, a dear friend to so many in Albury and beyond. Our thoughts are with his family. We are thankful for his great contribution to the life of the Region. He will be remembered with love.
