

### These Are Our Church's Needs

#### For Ourselves

- 1. To build new Church Halls at ST. MATTHEW'S because the City Council gives notice that it will soon take over our land and buildings in Olive Street and it is OUR RESPONSIBILITY to provide replacements.
- 2. To build two new residences-
  - (a) For an assistant at St. Matthew's;
  - (b) For a Rector for the new Parish of North Albury.
- 3. To ENLARGE the Church of All Saints.
- 4.\* To ENLARGE the Church of St. James, Lavington.
- 5. To REPAY £3000 still owing on St. Mark's Church, Gulpha Street, North Albury.
- 6. To REBUILD the organ at St. Matthew's.
- 7. TO PROVIDE salaries and working expenses for sorely needed additional staff, so that God's work can be properly carried on in this rapidly expanding parish.


Contrary to popular opinion, Churches do not function on air, nor yet on the goodwill of those who use them. They function upon the acceptance of responsibility by Christian people.

## The Need of the Giver to Give

Our needs as a Church are plain to anyone who stops to give a thought. These needs, however, are invariably seen in a detached way, and the individual is not related to the needs.

But the giver has a need of his own. It is to give.

There is that within all of us which uplifts the soul when a pure gift is made, and the stimulation carries the giver onwards. And the greatest stimulation comes from that gift which is given at cost to the giver.

For there are two kinds of giving:


There is that which is a token . . . given to save the face of the giver. It costs nothing; it means nothing; it saves embarrassment.

There is sacrificial giving . . . given after thought and realisation of the need of the receiver. It is deliberate; it brings with its giving an elation. It is a true gift. The need of the giver is a personal need to give, that brings a sacrifice with the gift.








ST. JAMES', LAVINGTON



FOR PLEDGES
PAYABLE WEEKLY
OVER A 150-WEEK PERIOD
BEGINNING DECEMBER 8, 1957

We are asking all members and friends of the Church to set aside a portion of their income each week for 150 weeks for the Church—and that portion be a generous and sacrificial part of their income so that the Church will assume a proper place in the family budget.

Canvassing will be limited to members, prospective Church members, parents of Sunday School children and any other persons and families who consider themselves affiliated with our Church.

Weekly pledges will be sought, so that our giving may be associated with our weekly worship.

A pledge is a written statement that we will "try to contribute" a weekly sum that we specify. But it is made clear on the pledge card that the offering pledged may be revised or cancelled should circumstances make it necessary. A pledge is not a legal obligation.

Qualified lay members of the Church will visit each family of the Church individually and privately in the homes during the canvass period. There will be no group canvassing in meetings. No canvassing will be conducted by mail.

The canvass objective is a total of £55,000, to be paid over 150 weeks by the Church of England families in this parish.

## The Challenge To-day

Many of us have never fully shared in the support of the Church. By the generosity and sacrifice of others we have been privileged to worship in Churches which have been built and maintained through the efforts of these people, who through their call of service and love of Christianity have provided us with the opportunity to worship.

It is now our turn to carry on and share with others the thrilling experience of taking a greater part in the support of our Church needs.

The great need of the age in which we live is a spiritual awakening, which can only be achieved by an active, well-supported and generous Church which is mature enough to face them squarely. This, then, is the challenge to us all.

Let us boldly accept this challenge and undertake our responsibilities, with vigour and enthusiasm.

## How to Make Your Pledge

In the careful and prayerful consideration of "How much shall we give", we should think of several points, for the size of our pledges depend upon:

- Our Christian Faith.
- Our interest in the Church programme.
- Our recognition of the need.
- Our concern for extended service.
- Our willingness to sacrifice.
- Our desire to encourage others to sacrifice.
- Our willingness to trust God and believe His promise.
- Our faithfulness in prayer.

One of the greatest experiences in the life of a Christian is that of helping to build a Church. To extend the services of his Church in the community is to widen his horizons of Christian living and fellowship. Until he has made an investment in the building of a Church, he is more or less accepting the far-sighted charity of others every time he or his children use a Church.

Remember that the greatest effort of sacrificial pledging is upon the donor himself. The spiritual value of sacrifice has been known to man since before Christianity. There would be no Christians today if it were not for great sacrifices of our early Christian leaders. You and your family are requested to begin now giving serious prayerful consideration to the amount you will endeavour to contribute to your Church.

But as the Canvass proceeds their influence will be greater still, for they have felt very closely the effect the life of the Church has had on the training of their children.




